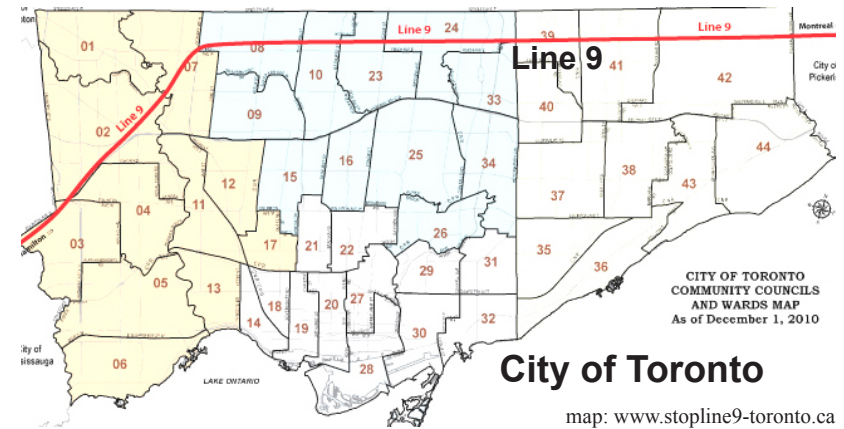

Line 9 Threatens Your Safety



Enbridge Corp. wants to equip its “Line 9,” a pipeline running across Toronto, to carry tar sands oil (diluted bitumen or “dilbit”). Corrosive dilbit would be pumped through the 37-year-old pipe at high temperatures and pressures, with a great risk of rupture and spill.

Three years ago, a dilbit spill in Michigan (see over) poisoned residents, and resulting tar pollution has not yet been cleaned up.

A tar sands spill on Enbridge’s Line 9 could spread toxic fumes across the city and foul the rivers feeding our Lake Ontario water supply.

The magnificent Idle No More movement has brought the tar sands issue to national attention. Exploitation of the tar sands speeds up climate change, posing a threat to all the world’s peoples.

Toronto City Council wants a say on Line 9. Councillors have voted unanimously to demand information on Enbridge’s plans and intervene in regulatory hearings.

We need to speak up. Make your views known to elected officials and join in spreading the word: Stop Line 9!
